

VISITING RESEARCHERS

- Applications for Visiting Researcher status are invited from those researching in fields that complement the work of the Institute.
- Applications may be made to attend the Institute for periods ranging from one month to one year.
- All enquiries concerning Visiting Researcher status should be made to the Research Director. It is strongly advised that potential applicants contact the Research Director at les.johnston@port.ac.uk before making a formal application
- Applicants will be asked to submit a current c.v. and an outline of the programme of research they intend to undertake while attending the Institute. They should also specify the proposed start and end dates of their visit.
- All applications will be assessed by the ICJS Research Leadership Group. As well as considering academic criteria due consideration will be given to the availability of office space at the times requested.
- While in attendance at the University the Visiting Researcher will normally work collaboratively towards the production of one or more specified research outputs with at least one colleague from ICJS. Examples of such output might include the production of a jointly authored paper for submission to a refereed journal; the joint undertaking of a piece of empirical research; or the joint writing of a research proposal for future funding.
- While in attendance at the University the Visiting Researcher will be expected to present a paper to a staff-postgraduate research seminar
- Visiting Researchers will be allocated office space for the duration of their visit. They will also have access to a computer, to University library facilities and to telephone use (not international calls) for purposes related only to their programme of research at the Institute.
- Visiting Researchers may be required to pay a bench fee (sum defined by the University) for attendance at the Institute.
- ICJS normally expects Visiting Researchers to do a small amount of teaching while in attendance at the University.
